## Feline Vaccine Protocol

### 8 Weeks Old

- FVRCP Vaccine Series #1 of 3 (Feline Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus, Panleukopenia)
- Drontal Deworming
- Fecal Exam at 8 or 12 weeks
- Start flea prevention at first visit, then monthly depending on lifestyle

### 12 Weeks Old

- FVRCP Vaccine Series #2 of 3 (Feline Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus, Panleukopenia)
- FeLV Vaccine (Feline Leukemia) Series #1 of 2
- Drontal Deworming

### 16 Week Old

- FVRCP Vaccine Series #3 of 3 (Feline Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus, Panleukopenia) – booster in 1 year
- FeLV Vaccine (Feline Leukemia) Series #2 of 2 – booster in 1 year
- Rabies Vaccine – booster in 1 year

### 1 Year Old

- FVRCP Vaccine (Feline Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus, Panleukopenia) – booster 3 years or evaluate need for vaccine titer test (Panleukopenia)
- Rabies Vaccine (booster every 3 years for outdoor cats or as recommended by your veterinarian)
- FeLV (boosted annually for outdoor cats or as recommended by your veterinarian)
- Fecal Test (annually for outdoor cats)

What To Expect After Your Pet's Vaccination	
Common symptoms include...	Rare symptoms include...
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Mild fever</li><li>• Decrease in social behavior</li><li>• Diminished appetite or activity</li><li>• Discomfort or mild swelling at the injection site</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Swelling to face and legs</li><li>• Repeated vomiting or diarrhea</li><li>• Whole body itching</li><li>• Difficulty breathing</li><li>• Collapse</li></ul>
It's common for your pet to experience mild side effects from vaccination. Typically starting within hours of vaccination, any symptoms are most often mild and usually do not persist for more than a few days. This is a normal response by your pet's immune system during the process of developing protective immunity.	If your pet experiences any of these rare symptoms, you should contact your veterinarian immediately, as your pet may require additional medical treatment.
